In April, Farmer Karl visited eight farms with social missions on the east coast:

We are delighted to introduce to you Sara Marie Hamilton, our new Director of Cultivation! Originally from Berkeley, California, Sara Marie Hamilton has hands-on experience as an entrepreneur, farmer, food-system leader, and community organizer. She specializes in linking people with the resources needed to sustainably create abundance. Sara Marie sees farming as a powerful means toward social and environmental justice reform. With direct experience running a small family farm in Oregon, she employs

regenerative, land-management practices to address community causes. As an instructor at Full Life Pilates and managing partner at the Slow Life Farm, she managed social media and customer relations. Sara Marie is certified in advanced permaculture, growing small farms, and sustainable agriculture.

We also added two new board members who are farmers. We are looking to fill a seven-member board with 4 farmers and 3 exceptional business leaders. [Anne Dunaway](#) joins us a leader of local food systems and a cooperative approach to local farming. "Grow Ogden" Farm

Since January, Eden Streets has endeavored to create a farm with a social mission in a community with which we have had no personal connections. Convinced of the opportunity that Ogden's demographics present in Utah, we proposed the farm "Grow Ogden" to community leaders in Ogden, Utah. The initial proposal was developed by a team of ten who submitted the proposal as part of the Permaculture Institute of North America project design contest. We were recognized as semifinalists. The document served to spawn discussions with nonprofits, particularly the Lantern House, the largest homeless shelter in northern Utah. The Lantern House board is excited about the possibility of having the farm on two acres of land just east of their property.

On June 28th, Ogden City Administration tentatively and informally gave preliminary approval to lease the land to the farm operating organization provided Eden Streets

find the appropriate local host organization. Our analysis shows a Social Return on Investment (SROI) at the end of the fifth year as 2.71 with a net present value of \$6.2M. What that means is for every dollar spent on the farm, \$2.71 is returned to the community or of social value including less pressure on police force as well as less trips to the emergency room. SROI measures change in ways relevant to the people or organizations that experience or contribute to it, assigning monetary values to represent social, environmental, and economic outcomes. As a result, this valuation produces a ratio of benefits to costs or investments (inputs). The return from a farm with a social mission comes in the form of stable income earned by those who graduate from the farm program. It also includes savings of the per-capital costs for government programs and case managers who support those experiencing homelessness.

Eden Streets is working with various nonprofits to find a host incubator organization for "Grow Ogden" farm nonprofit. Scopes of responsibility for each organization have been outlined. We have also been working with the Lantern House to draft a grant application to help fund the farm. With the experience we are getting, we will be able to share a case study on how a farm can be established in a city. Headquarters Move to Ogden

Eden Streets moved in the beginning of July to Ogden, Utah to learn directly how to design, build, and startup a farm with a social mission. We are excited to become part of an "ecosystem" of nonprofits, university, and government organizations to establish the farm "Grow Ogden".

Sharing Eden Streets' Story



Eden Streets brings together the land owners, government leaders, the donors & sponsors, and nonprofit community leaders to make farms with social missions a reality. We are striving to package the process and the information in a way that we can empower you as new farmers with social missions to succeed in operating your farms. For those who already are operating farms, we hope this information will support you or make you aware of new possibilities.

As we develop grant-writing experience, we note how farms with social missions address all nine social determinants of health as shown in this model. We hope to empower you with evidence-based case studies that enable you to be awarded grant funding.
